Juvenile Court Judge Addresses Faculty Group

Recognized over the nation as an expert in dealing with the problems of juvenile delinquency, Judge Schramm indicated that the "Indians Responsibilities of the School for Juvenile Delinquents."

Judge Schramm advocated a corrective rather than a punitive approach to the solution of juvenile delinquency.

Most children who err, Judge Schramm indicated, can be aided and corrected by kindness and proper care. In many instances juvenile delinquency may be attributed to home conditions which when corrected result in an adjusted youngster.

Good Grooming Tips For Furniture

For that well-groomed look, treat your furniture with the Indianing suggests Miss Ellen K. Garber, Home Economics Extension Representative, Indiana County. The wax protects the surface from wear and adds beauty with the minimum of care.

Special polishes provide a protective finish for furniture. For most furniture, a cream wax, a paste wax, or a liquid cleaning and polishing wax is acceptable.

One of the big advantages of these cream wax polishes over the familiar oil polishes is a finish that stays bright and can be dusted in a jiffy. The oil finishes give a temporary bright, but soon become streaky and sticky and hold dust, explains Miss Garber. Besides giving a rich sheen, a wax finish is a protection against fingerprints and soil marks.

Paste wax will give maximum protection to pieces of furniture that are likely to get scratched or have liquids spilled on them. Cream wax contains a blend of cleaning agents that are effective in removing all kinds of dirt. With a cream wax it's necessary to wash the surface before applying wax. The liquid cleaning and polishing waxes, says Miss Garber, remove most stains except ones requiring soap and water. This type of wax is most commonly used for wood floors, but may be used on furniture.

Whichever type wax you decide to use, follow the directions given on the container for its use. On most surfaces a good wax polish two or three times a year is enough. Hard-used furniture, like table tops, may need waxing more often. A light dusting with a dry, clean cloth will keep surfaces good looking between waxings.
